Shi Qing is an artist currently based in Shanghai, China. His work involves a variety of media including installation, video, and performance, emphasizing subject practice and media writing based on field work. He touches upon the fields of body and site, nomadic geography, spatial production, media archaeology, and socialist technology history. He is also an active organizer of various social projects, acting as a co-founder of institutions such as Radical Space, Chongging Work Institution, and Jiangnan Stack.

#### Split Up

25'26" (2013)

Split Up is the author's visual response to the famous "Anting Incident" in the history of China's Cultural Revolution and to some of the ideas of French philosopher Alain Badiou. The film draws on some of the aesthetic features of the "Cultural Revolution films" of the time, as well as on a number of historical events in Shanghai during the Cultural Revolution.

#### Qian Xuesen and the Yangtze River Computer 61'23" (2021)

Qian Xuesen and the Yangtze River Computer is a "past tense" historical science fiction story based on the history of computing in new China and Qian Xuesen and his systems theory ideas, an alternative video writing on the history of the development of socialist electronics, borrowing from the reportage form that was widely used in the 1980s.

Popo Fan is a Berlin-based filmmaker, writer, and activist from China, where his queer documentary films have made a notable impact. Since 2016, he has concentrated on writing and directing scripted, sex-positive shorts. He is the founder of the Queer University Video Training Camp and has been an organizer of the Beijing Queer Film Festival for more than a decade. Popo was invited to sit on the jury of the Teddy Award of the Berlinale in 2019.

#### Beer! Beer! 17'00", Germany (2019)

Beer! Beer! is an "anti-romantic comedy" set in the early morning following a wild party in Berlin. When Tao, a Chinese guy, meets Sebastian, a local German. As they seem to get more and more intimate with each other, suddenly a mattress changes everything...

#### The VaChina Monologues

228'00", China (2018)

The short documentary explores how *The Vagina Monologues* (1996), the iconic yet controversial play by Eve Ensler, has become an empowering tool for feminist and women's groups all over China.

#### The Drum Tower

18'00", China (2018)

An introverted senior school student and a transgender vintage shop-owner: two lonely souls swimming in the everchanging pool of the city. Can they break through wall of communication? This is the first film in China with all transgender leading cast.

Zhu Rikun is an independent film director and producer, as well as a curator from China. He is the founder of Fanhall Films and chief editor of cinema website fanhall.com. Zhu founded Documentary Film Festival China in 2003, which is one of the earliest independent film festivals in China. As a director, Zhu's has made the following film: The Questioning, The Dossier, Welcome, Dust, Anni, and No Desire to Hide (also named Siren in original title).

#### No Desire to Hide

91'00", China (2021)

No Desire to Hide (海妖) is the latest documentary film directed by Zhu Rikun.

The film delves into ordinary lives of young people in China, zooming in on their romantic problems, unfulfilled dreams and existential crises that are interwoven into their dialogues and

conversations with the director.
While the two central protagonists try to function in an open relationship, their relationship is rife with potential conflicts as the two of them have very different views on marriage and family life. The possibility of emigration to America might offer an opportunity for the couple, but the hope it brings along is gradually receding due to worsening political situation.
